



Dr. Celedón is the Niels K. Jerne Professor of Pediatrics and Division Chief of Pediatric Pulmonary Medicine at the University of Pittsburgh. After obtaining his medical degree from the Pontificia Universidad Javeriana in Bogotá (Colombia), he served an Internship in Internal Medicine at Lincoln Hospital (New York Medical College, NY), a residency in Internal Medicine at Beth Israel Medical Center (Mount Sinai School of Medicine, New York) and a Fellowship in Pulmonary and Critical Care Medicine at Brown University Hospitals (Providence, RI). Following his clinical training, Dr. Celedón completed a Research Fellowship in Respiratory Diseases at the Channing Laboratory of Brigham and Women's Hospital and Harvard Medical School, while also obtaining a doctoral degree in Public Health from the Harvard School of Public Health.

Dr. Celedón is a distinguished physician-scientist and mentor who has authored or co-authored over 360 publications on the genomics and epidemiology of airway diseases, focusing on Hispanics and other minority groups. He was the first faculty member to receive both the Young Mentor Award (2005) and the Clifford Barger Excellence in Mentoring Award (2010) from Harvard Medical School. In appreciation of his scientific contributions, he was elected to the American Society for Clinical Investigation and the Association of American Physicians, while also receiving the "Recognition Award for Scientific Accomplishments", the "Lifetime Achievement Award for Innovations in Health Equality", and the "John Peters Award" from the American Thoracic Society (ATS). In May 2020, Dr. Celedón became the first Latino to serve as ATS President since the society was founded in 1905.



Dr. Roberto Johansson is board certified in general pediatrics and pediatric critical care. Presently, he is an attending at Salud de Familiar La Fe in El Paso, Texas. He is also a clinical associate professor of pediatrics at the Paul L. Foster School of Medicine at Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center.

Dr. Johansson completed his pediatric residency at Children's Hospital of New York at Columbia University followed by a fellowship in pediatric critical care medicine at Cornell University. The American Society for Microbiology has awarded him an ICAAC Young Investigator Award. He has been awarded memberships into Alpha Omega Alpha and the Arnold Gold Humanitarian Society. He is the author of many peer reviewed scientific articles. He was also part of the Child Advocacy Committee in New York State for 20 years and
