Washington, DC — The National Hispanic Medical Association (NHMA) applauds Congressman Raul Ruiz, MD (D-CA-25), Congresswoman Yadira Caraveo, MD (D-CO-08) and Congresswoman María Elvira Salazar (R-FL-27) for introducing a House resolution, with Senator Alex Padilla (D-CA) and Senator John Cornyn (R-TX) introducing a Senate resolution, to designate October 1st as "National Latino and Latina Physician Day" to recognize our Latino and Latina physicians providing health care to countless people each and every day across the country.
