The Landscape We Are Navigating

- Advocacy is unfolding in a hostile political climate with escalating anti-LGBTQ+, anti-immigrant, and anti-public health legislation.
- Policy attacks range from restrictions on gender-affirming care and reproductive rights to immigration crackdowns and cuts to safety-net programs.
- These measures directly shape how we fund, communicate, and deliver services and who feels safe accessing them.
- Misinformation and political polarization make it harder to build consensus, increasing the urgency for trusted messengers and community-driven advocacy.
- Strategy and solidarity are essential: we build power through collective action rooted in justice, equity, and community resilience.



Community-Led Insights: Barriers & Opportunities from the GMoC Fellowship

- Led by NMAC's Treatment Division; focused on gay & bisexual men of color.
- Participatory action research: community-led focus groups + surveys, grounded in lived experience.
- Findings highlight persistent barriers to PrEP access from stigma to cost and opportunities for culturally competent, community-driven solutions.
- Ideal access: PrEP integrated into routine care, free/affordable, offered in stigma-free, culturally affirming spaces.
- Emphasized community-led strategies: peer outreach, trusted messengers, and targeted education campaigns.



The Barriers We're Up Against

- Structural racism, xenophobia, and anti-LGBTQ+ policies undermine HIV prevention and care.
- Limited provider knowledge about HIV prevention tools like PrEP and PEP.
- Healthcare systems that are often inaccessible: long waits, poor follow-up, and limited clinic hours.
- Stigma and fear of disclosure discourage people from seeking care.
- Financial barriers: gaps in insurance coverage, prior authorizations, and out-of-pocket costs.



Systemic Barriers Impacting HIV Care

- Stigma: societal, internalized, and institutional stigma around HIV and sexual health.
- Discrimination: bias based on race, sexual orientation, gender identity, or immigration status.
- Insurance challenges: denials for PrEP, lack of Medicaid expansion, gaps in Medicare coverage.
- Mistrust in healthcare systems often rooted in lived experiences of neglect or harm.
- Structural policies that limit access for immigrants, transgender people, and low-income patients.



How Social Determinants of Health Shape Outcomes

- Health outcomes are shaped by the environments and circumstances people experience throughout life from birth to old age and are influenced by the policies, programs and systems that impact those conditions.
- Housing stability, employment, income, and education directly influence HIV outcomes.
- Transportation, clinic location, and work schedules impact ability to access care.
- Language access and cultural competency remain inconsistent in healthcare settings.
- Social class and affordability: cost of care disproportionately burdens lower-income and older individuals.
- GMoC data shows mistrust and systemic exclusion compound these inequities for BIPOC LGBTQ+ communities.



Breaking Barriers in Practice

- Investing in BIPOC and trans-led organizations with targeted capacity building.
- Creating safe, stigma-free spaces for care like community-based PrEP access points.
- Providing legal clinics, Know Your Rights resources, and advocacy toolkits.
- Building peer-led outreach networks that connect patients to affirming providers.
- Coordinating cross-sector advocacy to challenge harmful laws and policies.



What Works: Navigating a Hostile Political Climate

- Aligning across movements racial justice, LGBTQ+ rights, immigration, women's rights.
- Rapid response systems: sign-on letters, petitions, coordinated advocacy pushes.
- Accessible resources: toolkits, policy briefings, and messaging guides for advocates.
- Centering community stories to humanize the impact of policies.
- Leveraging national-local partnerships to protect and expand access to care.



Strategic Messaging in a Polarized Climate

- Frame issues in ways decision-makers can hear: cost, systems, outcomes.
- Tailor language without compromising values or mission.
- Use local data: demographics, coverage rates, cost implications of inaction.
- Elevate patient and provider voices stories drive empathy and urgency.
- Avoid jargon; focus on tangible impacts for communities.






How does PrEP work?

PrEP (pre-exposure prophylaxis) is a highly effective medicine that can greatly reduce your chance of getting HIV from sex or injection drug use when taken as prescribed. PrEP can be pills or shots. A health care provider can help you decide whether pills or shots are right for you.

Is PrEP safe?

Yes, PrEP is safe. Some people may experience mild to moderate. ke diarrhea, nausea, headache, fatigue, or stomach pains. Th "w go away over time. Your health care provider shr actions with other medications you
