At the Coalition, JP coordinates cross-movement engagement, supports rapid response efforts, and helps partner organizations amplify their voices and protect their communities amid legal, political, and funding challenges. His work focuses on bridging national strategy with community-led solutions and fostering spaces for collaboration, visibility, and protection across sectors.

JP's broader career has included leading deeply grassroots, community-driven political campaigns, including mayoral and congressional races. He has built and managed field operations rooted in community organizing, led voter outreach efforts, and developed coalition-building strategies that center equity, lived experience, and collective power.

He holds a J.D. and B.A. from the University of Puerto Rico and an MBA from Georgetown University. JP also serves as President of the Board of Hasta 'Bajo Project, the first nonprofit historical archive of reggaetón music and culture, where he works to preserve and elevate Puerto Rican history through a cultural justice lens.
